#### 1. INTRODUCTION

This class introduces students to a wide variety of literature on emotions and social life. Beginning with classical readings in philosophical psychology, students will move on to review a wide range of contemporary sociological and anthropological perspectives on the interplay between emotion and society. Emphasizing both theoretical and empirical work, some topics covered by this class include: managing versus accounting for emotion, emotion and the body, emotion and gender, the political economy of emotion, emotion and the self, the mass media and emotion, and emotional aspects of self presentation. Special attention will be paid throughout to the interrelationship between emotion, social structure, and cultural belief systems.

#### 2. CLASS METHOD

The class will be conducted through primarily through lectures, though I encourage student questions and discussion. Since I do not always stick to the readings in my lectures, all classes should be attended to get the most out of this course. It will be important to keep up with the course material and to seek clarifications in or out of class.

## 3. EVALUATION AND REQUIREMENTS

- a) A Mid-Term exam will be written in class on March 2. It will be worth 30% of the final grade.
- b) A term paper discussing and analyzing select emotional issues will be

due on March 18. Details will be distributed in class. This paper will be worth 40% of the final grade.
