# **Course Description & Objectives**

This course explores the historical development of the principal doctrines of Christianity from the period of the Early Church to the Middle Ages. Among the topics we consider are: worship and liturgy; iconography and church architecture; tensions among Christians, Jews and pagans; struggles between heresy and orthodoxy; the phenomena of persecution and martyrdom; conquest, conversion, and crusades; pilgrimage and popular piety. The main purpose of the course is to acquaint students with the broad trajectory of Christian history from the New Testament era to the medieval period. Students will gain historical literacy, and should be able to intelligently discuss and write about several key figures, texts, movements, and doctrines that gave shape to the early and medieval church in Europe.

## **Evaluation**

Attendance and Participation – From time to time I will assign response papers on course readings, either in class or due the following class. These will be graded pass/fail, and count in assessing your contributions and participation. (10%)

<u>Three Quizzes</u> – based on lectures and assigned readings; a combination of multiple choice, matching and short answer. (30% - 10% each)

<u>Writing Assignments</u> – three writing assignments, each approximately 1000 words. Details to be given in class. (30%; 10% each)

Final Exam – a scheduled final exam covering the course in its entirety. (30%)
